

Jesus is...the Lamb of God

John 1:29 "Look! The Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world."

In today's urban society, many people don't often come into contact with farm animals. So when the Bible describes Jesus as "the Lamb of God," it's easy to miss the comfort in this unique name for our Savior.

When John the Baptist pointed to Jesus and said, "Look! The Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world," it would have immediately grabbed the Jews attention. God had commanded the sacrifice of lambs as part of their worship life to teach them that they needed the blood of a substitute to pay for their sins. They couldn't just make that sacrifice once. They had to offer it again and again because it was imperfect blood offered by imperfect people. They sacrificed animals, lambs that could never really take away their sin.

Sometimes we don't understand the full magnitude of our sin. Sin isn't just what we read about in the newspapers. Sin is when parents want the best for their children, but allow other things to become more important. Sin is when spouses want to be loving, but instead put their own needs and desires first. Sin is when teenagers struggle for independence and step over the line of disrespecting their parents and others in authority. Sin is nothing more and nothing less than failing to be the perfect people our perfect God demands of us.

We need the perfect blood of a substitute to take away our sins. Jesus is the only Lamb who could do that because he's the *Lamb of God*. He's the perfect Lamb who never fell short of God's expectations. He's the Substitute offered on the altar of the cross. His blood fully pays for the sin of the world. And that means he paid for your sin too! He's the Sacrifice that enables you to live life without fear of God's punishment. Jesus is the Lamb who gave you what you could never earn—eternal life and a home with him in heaven.

As we enter Lent this month, our focus is on everything the Lamb has done for us. We invite you to gather with us to thank him who died for us and to sing, "Worthy is the Lamb, who was slain, to receive power and wealth and wisdom and strength and honor and glory and praise" (Revelation 5:12).

Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church, Chesaning, Michigan SUMMARY OF COORDINATING COUNCIL MINUTES Tuesday, February 11, 2014 at 8:00 p.m.

The meeting opened with devotion.

Pastor's Report: At his request Tom Beagle was transferred to Saint John Lutheran Church in Hemlock, Michigan. Aaron Schulz and son Jackson were transferred to Good Shepherd Lutheran in Alma, Michigan.

Reports of Officers and Boards:

- Our Financial Secretary, Joe Donovan, reported that he has received so far in the current fiscal year \$182,041.56 in offerings from July 1 through January 31, 2014. This comes to an average of \$5,169 per Sunday for the first 30 Sundays of our fiscal year. Our budget requires \$5,360 to meet our budget. We have fallen behind \$191 each week and we are currently \$5,730 under budget for the first 30 Sundays.
- Our Treasurer, Robert Wille, reported that he has received \$181,208,56 in offerings from our Financial Secretary. He reports that we are holding approximately, \$30,000 in unpaid bills.
- School Board Chairman, Bill Hedrich, reported that Zion has 8 snow days. Zion is waiting to see if Chesaning Union Schools will be adding days to the school year.
- Property Board Chairman, Ray Klipper, reported that Leon Bishop was called to fix the plumbing problems at the duplex.
- Evangelism Board Chairman, Dave Huggard, reported that Zion will host an Easter For Kids at Easter time in place
 of the Harvest Festival in the fall. He also stated that we will need to have more people working the Candle Walk
 Booth this coming November.

OLD BUSINESS

• **Heating and Cooling:** A bid for Quackenbush Heating and Cooling came in at \$46,029.04. The Council is awaiting two more bids for forced air.

NEW BUSINESS

- **Scholarship Fund:** The Church Council approved the requests for scholarship money from Han Thomford and Orie Thomford. This was approved by the Council.
- **Budget Committee:** The Coordinating Council approved the Budget Committee for the 2014-2015 Budget Committee. The members will be Pastor Thomford, Matthew Augustine, Dave Mose, Joe Donovan, Robert Wille, and one Elders' Board member. The first Budget meeting will be Monday, March 17, 2014 at 7:00 p.m. at Church.
- **Membership Releases:** The Elders' Board recommended that Pat Brown and Kevin and Mary Hickmott and son Johnathon bill released from membership. The Coordinating Council approved this.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT—MARCH 2014

This past winter my wife and I enjoyed being able to once again coach a sport. My wife coached cheerleading for Zion and I assisted coaching boy's basketball. Coaching uses many of the same techniques as teaching does, but it allows players an opportunity to use different God-given skills than we often assess in a classroom setting. Players are asked to not only remember information, but also apply that information to make decisions and react to their surroundings. Coaches are in place to give advice and teach lessons to players so that they can be better prepared for challenges faced during gameplay, if the player is open to that help.

A player who is coachable understands that they can improve, but they must first admit their imperfections. It does not come naturally to all athletes although it sounds like an easy task. An athlete may hear the coach's lessons and disregard them as folly. I myself have suffered the consequences of foolish pride. To this day I still cannot make a left-handed layup in basketball because I did not adequately practice that skill as my coaches told me long ago. Foolish pride is to blame.

Young athletes are not the only people who must be coachable; rather, we are all living out the game of life and are looking for answers to life's pressing questions. We also need to be coachable. Showing the humility of a coachable player can allow us to more adequately serve others, respect others more highly, and improve relationships strained by pride. We become better servants as we see our need for Christ and follow his example of foot-washing (John 13). If we increase respect for others, our ability to listen to the needs of others increases along with that. And as we listen and serve others, we will inevitably enjoy healthy relationships. Not only will students and athletes at Zion Lutheran benefit from being coachable, but we also will reap benefits when we strive to live with the humility of Christ.

God's blessings on the beginning of your spring, and keep our school in your prayers as we strive to carry out the humble work of spiritually and academically training our next generation.

- In February, Zion students performed in a well-attended patriotic concert for parents and church members.
- The Board of Education will soon debut a Tuition Assistance Fund to help our school's families who may not be able to attend Zion based on financial hardship.
- Basketball and cheerleading season has ended on a positive note, and we will soon begin co-ed volleyball for students in the upper grades.
- Zion will spend March 10-13 completing Iowa Standardized Tests to check how each student has academically
 grown in the past year. We will discuss results with parents a few weeks later at the Parent/Teacher Conferences on March 27.



Butterfly Pretzels

Celebrate being a new creation by making this fun spring snack.




What you need:

- 45 miniature twist pretzels (to make 20 butterflies)
- Cookie sheet covered with parchment paper
- Light cocoa and multicolored Candy Melts (available at craft stores)
- Disposable decorating bags
- M&M's, Skittles, sprinkles, cinnamon drops, etc.

What you do:

- 1. Break five pretzels into pieces for antennae.
- 2. On cookie sheet, arrange pairs of whole pretzels as shown.
- 3. Melt Candy Melts in microwave, separating colors into different bags.
- 4. Pipe melted brown candy down the center to hold pretzels together, making a head and body. Press on two pretzel pieces for antennae.
- 5. Pipe other melted candy into the pretzel holes.
- 6. Add M&M's and other decorations into melted candy on the wings. Let cool. Enjoy!
