

Jesus Is: The Good Shepherd

John 10:11 "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep."

"Man Dies Trying to Save Trapped Bunny" pops up as you scroll through your news app. You tap on the video. You see what reminds you of the furry little Cadbury Creme Egg mascot. A heroic rescue follows.

You're baffled. You're impressed! You think...What inspired that guy to give his own life for a bunny? Come to think of it, I sometimes forget even to feed my own pet!

Try another headline: **Man Dies to Save World**. That headline actually does pop up when you read the Bible. At first it may sound like it's from a too-predictable superhero movie. It seems too good to be true. But it is true! Jesus is that man. He died an agonizing, humiliating death on a Roman torture-pole to save the world. He wasn't saving it from global warming or hunger or war, but saving it from damnation. And despite what some speculate, Jesus didn't come to post the 10 commandments at every town hall and enforce them. No, the world *already* stood condemned by the law because of its sin. Instead, Jesus came to rescue the world. By the way, "world" means everyone in it. That included *you* too!

Look at the extraordinary heroism in Jesus, this world's Rescuer! Really, it was more than heroism. He, being true God, displayed God's love and God's plan to give forgiveness and eternal life to all. Jesus' life, death, and bodily resurrection show us the very heart of God. This is a headline worth your time. It is worth hearing and reading more about. Scroll on.

Here's a way to picture Jesus your God and Savior: Jesus is "*The Good Shepherd*". He describes himself, "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep" (John 10:11). We've strayed and "bleated up" life because we're sinful. We are lost sheep needing rescue. Not just by a hired hand. Not just a no-name hero, forgotten tomorrow. Not just by any shepherd, but by *The Good Shepherd*. Jesus is the good shepherd who, being both God and man, laid down his life for you. He really did save the whole world. Your sins are forgiven. Praise His unending love!

Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church, Chesaning, Michigan SUMMARY OF COORDINATING COUNCIL MINUTES TUESDAY, APRIL 8, 2014

- **Pastor's Report:** The Coordinating council voted to release the following people: Holly Schoch, Ashley Bates, and Hector McKinnon. The council also transferred Nick Deming to St. John's Lutheran in Wauwatosa, WI.
- Financial Report: Secretary Joe Donovan reported that offerings are down about \$160 per Sunday for this month, and we are under by \$8,736.00 in offerings for the fiscal year. So far for the first 39 Sundays of this fiscal year, we have received \$229,652.25 in offerings. Treasurer Bob Wille reported that he is currently holding about \$37,000.00 in unpaid bills. He also reported that he has received \$229,652.25 from Joe Donovan and has spent \$230,970.58.
- School Board: Chairman Bill Hedrich reported that students from Zion will be attending a lock-in at Michigan Lutheran Seminary. A Tuition Assistance program is being set up by the School Board for families who have trouble making tuition payments. The board is also looking to replace the sign in the front of school's property.
- Elder's Board: Chairman Dennis Peters reported that they are calling inactive members and are planning on making several home visits in May. Pastor Thomford asked for some time off to assist his father and family with personal affairs.
- Property Board: Chairman Ray Klipper reported that we will have cleanup day on April 13th, 2014.
- **Old Business:** The status of heating and cooling project remains the same as the previous month. There is nothing new to report as the council is still looking at several bids on different systems.
- New Business
- The Coordinating council spent a great deal of time discussing how best to repair the church parking lot. The bid to replace the parking lot entirely was approximately \$50,000. The church council spent time discussing how to make temporary repairs to the parking lot until funds could be raised to replace the parking lot entirely. Joe Donovan will come with some new bids about temporary parking lot repairs at the next meeting.
- The Elders made a salary recommendation to keep the salary code the same as the previous year, but made a note that called workers should receive credit for their years of service.
- The Coordinating council also discussed the budget for the upcoming year. They voted to propose a budget of \$274,577 for 2014-2015 fiscal year, which is approximately \$4,000 less that the budget for 2013-2014. It will be presented to the voters on Sunday, June 8, 2014 at the Annual Meeting, where a meal will be provided.
- The council gave Pastor Thomford permission to get rid of the old confirmation picture cases on a "first-come, first-serve" basis.
- The church council is also looking into starting an online giving program. Joe Donovan is going to talk to Community State Bank for those people who would like to make their donations electronically to either church or school.
- The Annual Report will be started soon, so officers are asked to get their reports to the office by May 1, 2014.
- The Michigan District Convention will be held at MLS from Monday, June 9—Friday, June 11, 2014. Zion is looking for a lay delegate to represent our congregation and attend with Pastor Thomford and Mr. Augustine.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT-MAY 2014

Of all the things that I am thankful for about my wife, I mostly appreciate her spirit of contentment. It has come to my attention that not all women are satisfied to drive used cars or live in houses without cable, but thankfully mine is. This simple trait of contentment should not be underappreciated as financial disputes are the leading cause for divorce in America, according to financial author and radio talk show host Dave Ramsey. Material possessions are blessings, but can also be a source of conflict if not seen as such.

I am appreciative of the Lutheran school that our church as provided over the past thirty years. Parents who volunteer, students who are respectful, and teachers who are hard-working and love their students are not easily found, but Zion has been blessed with all of the above. Our school is a diamond in the rough, and I rejoice for all who help us in this mission.

With so much to be thankful for, why do we grumble? Humans can become discontent at the slightest provocation. Personally, it is my nature to be discontent, and I easily am frustrated with occasional misbehavior by students, lessons which don't go as I had dreamed, or enrollment numbers which don't set records. These thoughts can be toxic and blinding.

As a husband, teacher, and principal I am prone to discontent. The devil works to convince me that people or things are not blessings in my life, but challenges. The words of Ecclesiastes 5 help me at times like these. "When God gives anyone wealth and possessions, and enables him to enjoy them...this is a gift of God" (Ecc. 5:19).

Let us see the blessings which surround us, and when material possessions start to interfere with our thinking, return to the Word and recall that we already have everything – we have eternal life through Jesus' sacrifice. Our discontent nailed Him to the cross, but His amazing love triumphed and gives us more than enough to keep us content forever in heaven.

Let's thank God for the families at our school, and the strength of our student body. We are bound together with the Holy Scripture and we rejoice in our duty to study it daily. Thank you for your continued prayers and support.

- **Hosting Track Meet –** On Friday, May 16 our school will be hosting a track meet in Saginaw for 10 local Lutheran grade schools. We are looking for volunteers to help keep stats and run the concession stand. Contact Mr. Augustine if you are willing/able to help.
- Tuition Assistance The Board of Education has recently created a tuition program for Zion Lutheran School families who may have trouble paying tuition due to financial hardship. This new fund is separate from the Scholarship fund at church which is used to help MLS and MLC students. The Tuition Assistance program will be available for families at the beginning of next school year, but funds can be donated now by contacting Mr. Augustine or a Board of Education member.
- Meetings with Christ The Future of Education committee, which is made up of several men from Zion and also Christ in Oakley, has continued conversations about the possibility of improving our schools by way of merger. The meetings occur every two months and are going well. No proposal has been written for the voters at this time, but we hope that in the coming months we will be able to present something to our congregations for vote. (Submitted by: Matthew Augustine)

LUTHERAN WOMEN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY NEWS

Multi-Language Publications (MLP) is a program of the WELS Board for World Missions. It assists in the production of confessional Christian literature and media in a multitude of languages. We want many more people throughout the world to come to faith in Jesus as their crucified and risen Lord and Savior and thus have the promise of eternal life.

The World Mission Collection at Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary now contains nearly 2,500 titles in 65 languages. The MLP Catalog lists more than 700 titles in 45 languages. More than two million items are in print. Over 730,000 copies of Bible Teachings Distance learning programs have been distributed in 12 languages. Distance learning programs have reached in excess of 60,000 people in South Asia and Latin America. MLP is researching and developing ways to distribute publications in digital form. Our materials go into many countries where our missionaries are not welcome.

Please remember to pray for the safety of missionaries around the world, all those who reach out with the Gospel through ESL classes, for technological advances that help multi-language ministries, and graduates of our schools!

Almighty and eternal God, enable those who do not acknowledge Christ to receive the truth of the gospel. Help us, your Church, to grow in love for you and for one another, so that we become more perfect witnesses of your love for all people. Amen.





A farmer would never think of planting his seed year-around. But happily, the "seed" pictured in our Lord's parable can be planted at any time. So that's what the dedicated staff at our Pregnancy Counseling Centers in Flint and Saginaw do. Throughout this past year they:

- shared God's love with 304 clients
- shared the Law & Gospel with 486 clients
- shared God's Word on chastity with 325 clients
- shared God's Word on baptism with 439 clients and distributed 124 Bibles.

The planting has been done. A harvest has been promised. Prayers to a gracious God are on-going. Please remember us in your prayers!

1985:Saginaw Center opened in rented space on South

Michigan.

1996: Flint Center opened in rented space on Court Street.

2010: Our Saginaw Center moved to a donated building on Gratiot. Donated labor and generous gifts meant the estimated \$33,000 in renovation costs were able to be met without borrowing!

2013: Our Flint Center purchased space in a professional complex on Miller Road for \$65,000. A 15-year, fixed-rate loan was obtained from LACE at 5.75% with NO down payment! (That rate has since dropped to 4.75% because of designated investments.) If God wills, by 2026, our previous rental payment of \$950/month will retire the mortgage and we will own the condo outright.

Our New Points Program

Modeled after other "Earn While You Learn" programs, our PCC Points Program encourages clients to dig deeper into God's Word using a series of Bible-based, selfstudy books produced by the WELS Multi-Language Publications. Clients complete their study at home and then bring the book back to discuss whatever they did not understand with a counselor. Together they also work through a 'final test' so the counselor can reinforce newly-learned truths and correct lingering misconceptions

Last year the Saginaw Center gave out more than 480 of these study guides. At \$1.50@ that mounts up, but counselors and clients alike are excited by the many meaningful conversations and teachable moments that have resulted. It's especially heartwarming to see the light of understanding dawn when a precious Bible truth registers with a client for the first time.

The Points Program is optional, but those who participate can earn 5 points for every study they complete. The points accumulate and can eventually be redeemed for some very desirable items such as: gas cards, new baby clothes, toiletries, laundry detergent, potty chairs, high chairs, and even a pack-n-play. Now you know why those same items continue to reappear on our PCC Wish List!
